#### Marriage


William and Ann married at Mucklestone in 1832, Ann's name is here recorded as Greatbanks:

Note that one of the witnesses was Allan Jervis. This could be the brother of William; his baptism has not been found.

#### Census

In the 1841 census Ann Jervis was recorded (as Jarves or Jarvis) with her three daughters – names as per baptisms above – at Maerway Lane. Her husband William was not at home.



Ann's age of 25 (ie up to 29) suggests Elizabeth most probably was her first child.

As to missing William, newspaper pieces give the reason for his absence:

Staffordshire Gazette and County Standard 5 December 1840<sup>1</sup>:

William Jervis was charged by Elizabeth Simpson, of Maer Heath, with stealing from her shop some sugar, raisins, tobacco, and a stone of flour. The complainant suspecting that the prisoner had often plundered her, adopted the stratagem of leaving the house, to which, unseen by the prisoner, she returned and concealed herself. From her hiding place she saw Jervis and his wife enter, and steal the goods mentioned in the charge; the wife advising her husband to take the precaution of seeing whether the flour was marked. Mrs. Simp-son at once came upon the thieves, who took to flight, carrying with them their booty, which they secreted in an adjoining plantation, but no part of it had been found. He was taken into custody by Eardley the same day. The Bench committed the prisoner to the assizes for trial. The wife was afterwards brought up by the Maer constable, but was discharged on the legal presumption that she had acted under the control of her husband.

The same paper, 18 March 1841, carried a report of the trial:

SINGULAR CASE OF HOUSEBERARING.—William Jereic was indicated for breaking into the dwelling house of Edward Singuson, on the let Dec. at Maer, and stealing therefrom a quantity of grocery, his property.—Mr. Les conducted the prosecution, and Mr. Godson the defence.—Elizabeth Simpson, the wife of the prosecutor, stated that she and her busband lived at Maer, in this county, and kept a lucksters' shop there. On the first of December last she left her house, for the alleged purpose of going a journey. She set out at half-past ten o'clock in the merming, having first locked her door, and an passing the house of the prisoner, who was her neighbour, and whom she had long suspected of robbing her, she called, and seeing the prisoner's wife, she said she was going out for a few days. On having the house she went a few hundred jards, as though pursuing her intended journey, and then returned by a private way through a plantation to her house, and having entered it, she took out the key, and concealed herself in such a singrism as to command a full view of snything that might be going on within, without being observed. She had not remained long in her concealment before the prisoner and his wife entered her house by a fibre key, and having helped themselves to a considerable quantity of groceries, such as sngar, tea, currants, to-bacco, &c., they went to a flour tub, and having taken out a quantity and put it into a bag, the prisoner's wife said to him, "did you notice whether it was marked; for the last time I was here it was marked." On saying this, the witness rushed from her concealment, and said, "you two rogues, I have caught you at last." They then both run away into the plantation, and she

(witness) gave information to a constable. She had seen none of the things since.—She was cross-examined at some length, with a view to shew that the present proceeding arose out of an old gradge. This, however, she most distinctly denied.—Mr. Goossos addressed the jury, and said he should be able to shew that the prisoner was claewhere at the time the cobbery was alleged to have been committed. He called John Moreton, gamekeeper to T. Kinnersly, Esq., who had known the prisoner thirteen or fourteen years, and who during that time had been a good character. Ou the day of the robbery he (witness) was at a public hoose, kept by a man named Sail, which was about a mile from the house of the prosecutor. About ten o'clock that morning the prisoner come to Sail's with two besties. The landlord gave him a pint of ale, and he (witness) continued in his company for two hours. Between eleven and twelve o'clock Mrs. Simpson came and charged him with having robbed her shop. She was in a richent passion, and fell upon her knees several times, and wished the sarth might open and swallow her up if the charge was not true.—On cross-examination, he said that three persons took the prisoner into custody about eight o'clock in the evening.—Mr. Lets addressed the Jury, and contended that so far from the case for the prosecution having been seakened by the evidence of Moreton, it had been most materially strengthened by it.—The Jary found the prisoner guilty, and his lordship sentenced him to be imprisoned and kept to hard labour for tweive calendar months, the first and last week in solitary confinement.

Further checks of the 1841 census show Edward and Elizabeth Simpson, the hapless shop owners, recorded at Maer Heath, he being an ag lab age 45; Ann Jervis and her girls were recorded next but one, suggesting they lived nearby.

William was in prison in Stafford:




A burial of Ann Jerves of Maer Heath at Maer 8 Jul 1847, age 37, is probably William's wife. This left five children age 2 to 11 without their mother.

(aside: some family trees on Ancestry suggest Ann did not die at this point, and that she married Anthony Lee; there is a marriage of Ann Greatbatch to Anthony Lee at Stone Staffordshire 5 Nov 1849 but this Ann was a spinster, no indication of a previous relationship with William)

The 1851 census shows the three youngest children had been placed in the Union Workhouse, Shropshire Street, Market Drayton (the ditto following each name is for 'pauper').

The two older girls, Elizabeth and Sarah, were working as servants at Brooksby's Walk, parish of St John, Hackney, Middlesex. Their birthplaces were recorded as Moreheath (or Moreteath) in Staffordshire, presumaby an attempt at Maer Heath.




Coincidentally there was a third Jarvis in the household, Harriet, age 14, from Dorset.

In 1851 William was lodging in Aston, a township of Mucklestone with John Symcap or Symcup and his wife Sarah. William's elder brother, John, had married Hannah Simcock in 1823 and it is possible Hannah was related to John; more about this family at

. John Symc\*'s birthplace was Mucklestone. Pitchford is a surname that features in one of the earliest generations traced and it seems unlikely that Peter Pitchford was a relative...



The next house recorded in 1851 was occupied by Thomas and Elizabeth Shelmadine: Elizabeth was a witness at the wedding of Henry Jervis in 1843. The next house was occupied by George and Mary Jervis, George being the younger brother to William and elder brother to Henry, Louise's gt gt grandfather.

The 1861 census shows William in two households:

- Age 50, ag ab, bn Muxton, with dau Jane Howse at Aston (see later)
- Age 54, ag lab, bn Maer, with sister Jane Harding in Maer Heath (see below)

It is assumed this is one individual who was recorded twice and if there were two individuals it would complicate things. Only two local baptisms took place 1800-1812, one at Drayton in 1804 (JB) who is accounted for; and the son of Thomas, baptised at Mucklestone in 1807, of Maerway Lane.

The following entry from 1871 may be William: his birthplace and occupation match those from earlier censuses although his age is a few years younger than expected:




He was living in Aston, the same township as he was living in in 1851. Nearby in 1871 was George Jervis, also born Maer – his brother. No convincing matches in the 1881 census.

The following death is a good match to the 1807 baptism:

**To sum up**, William and Anne Jarvis married in Maer in 1832 and lived at Maerway Lane (in the area known as Maerheath) throughout their marriage until Anne's death in 1847.

They had five children. William worked as a labourer throughout his life and spent 12 months in prison after being convicted of theft in 1840. He remained in the area after his wife's death. The address of Aston recorded in the 1851 and 1871 censuses (cf Maerheath in 1861) does not necessarily mean William moved; it seems more likely that he remained at the same place but the description of the location varied over time. Aston was at the end of Maerway Lane – the arrow points to Maerway Lane:



Other branches of the family lived nearby in the censuses.

There are parallels to the life of Henry Jervis which lends support to the theory that they were brothers.

Some notes follow about four of his children, Elizabeth, Jane, George and Henry. (Sarah was in Hackney in 1851 but has not been found in later censuses).

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### William's daughter Elizabeth

William's eldest daughter Elizabeth may have moved to Newcastle-under-Lyme – this marriage in 1854 matches her birth year and details of her father:

### William's daughter Jane

Jane married John Dunn in 1860 at Woore; at that point both were living in Gravenhunger, a township of Mucklestone.

John Dunn aside: in the 1851 census John Dunn, age 11, was living with his parents John & Hannah Dunn, at Gravenhunger Moss. The previous property was occupied by William and Ann Banks, aged 29 and 23 and in their household were Ellen and Elizabeth Latham, age 7 & 5 'nursery'; along with a third 'nursery' child; assume Ann Banks took in other people's children (overnight though?). Ellen Latham remained in the area in 1861.

Returning to John and Jane Dunn (nee Jervis): in the 1861 census the young couple had Jane's father living with them (or perhaps they had moved in with him); their address 'The Cottage', Aston:

### William's son Henry

In 1861 William's son Henry was working in Knighton township, tything of Mucclestone, for Eliza Beeston, farmer. He was 15, a carter's boy, born Maer.

Note that Edward and Jane Machin lived nearby; this could be the couple who witnessed Jane Jervis's marriage to John Dunn the previous year.
